This brief summary of biblical teachings according to the Reformed tradition has been written to help children and adults understand and follow the way of salvation in our Lord Jesus Christ. It is designed to meet the reading and comprehension level of children in grades 5-6.

It follows the classic "sin, salvation, service" pattern of the Heidelberg Catechism, and the main contents are also taken, often word for word, from that great confession. Additional teachings are included from the Belgic Confession and from the contemporary testimony of the Christian Reformed Church, "Our World Belongs to God." 1. What is your only comfort as a Christian?

2. What must you know to have this comfort?
